Kia ora Salford Whānau,



Thank you to the whānau who joined us for this ceremony and supported the tamariki. It was lovely sharing kai together for breakfast as well. Thank you to the staff team who all joined in to ensure everything ran smoothly for everyone whether it was cooking sausages, preparing the sausages in bread with sauce, making and serving milo or taking photos to capture images of the event and of course all the tidying up afterwards. A team effort with everyone working together with one focus.

We followed our Hautapu ceremony up with Matariki rotations. Every child in the school was split into one of 12 mixed level groups with each group taking part in three rotations across the school. There was a lot going on and sharing afterwards in classrooms was full of excitement.

Drop Off Zone

The Drop Off Zone has been a much safer place recently, thank you for your support and assistance with keeping the tamariki safe.

Just two things that have started happening again that need to be stopped please.

- Children entering and exiting vehicles on the driver side of the vehicle. Cars are moving through the drop off on the driver side and cannot see the children walking around. Children MUST enter and exit vehicles on the footpath / passenger side of the vehicle please.
- 2. Cars trying to enter the drop off when there is no space available. If you cannot drive right into the drop off area please drive on and come back. Your children can wait for you to get back and for you to be able to drive in fully and safely.

IN ZONE Enrolments

Parents of children living "in zone" for Salford school are reminded to enrol your child for 2025. Especially where children are starting in terms 1 or 2. Your early enrolment helps us with the orginisation of classes for the 2025 school year. If your child turns 5 in terms 3 and 4, it is also helpful to know how many additional children to expect for the year.

Note for Parents of students on an <u>"Out of Zone</u> Enrolment", with siblings turning 5 in 2025.

Spaces for Out of Zone enrolments are very tight, so if you have a child turning 5 in 2025, not matter when this is. Please request an electronic enrolment pack to enrol your child **now**. We have had a number of late enrolments for siblings of children in 2024, who are residing out of our school zone and this alters the balance when a ballot needs to be held.

There is a need to remind Parents, this type of enrolment is <u>not</u> an automatic enrolment, so please enrol your children early before the school opens enrolment up to new "Out of Zone" inquiries.

North Waihopai River from Queens Drive to Racecourse Road

West Queens Drive, from Layard Street to Waihopai River

West side from 444 Queens Drive

East side from James Hargest Junior College

South North side of Layard Street from Queens Drive to

Racecourse Road

NOTE: Properties on the South Side of Layard Street,

are not included in the Salford School Home zone.

I'm writing to persuade you to allow Room 4 to have a pyjama day every Friday.


Firstly, I believe that Room 4 definitely should have weekly pyjama days because the weather is so cold now, we need a bit of motivation to get out of bed and come to school.
