They certainly make the areas look much tidier, brighter and fitting with our local environment. Thank you.

Welcome to our new whānau who have joined us here at Salford School in the past two weeks. We look forward to getting to know Dan, as they grow and learn through Salford School.

Whānau Picnic:

Bring a picnic tea and come and join us at school on Monday 26th February from 5:30pm through to 6:30pm for a nice, relaxing community get together.

This is just a casual evening picnicking on the grass with a chance to hear from the Staff, BOT and PTA about our goals for the year. Classrooms will also be open for your tamariki to show you around their learning space, and talk you through their books and learning etc. We hope you can all join us.

If the weather is not suitable for being outdoors we will have wet weather plans in place.

Unfortunately like many other Invercargill Schools, Covid is back at Salford.

The Ministry of Health recommends that people who test positive isolate for 5 days and they recommend anyone living with someone who is positive for Covid tests daily. Beyond these recommendations Covid is to be treated like a flu. If your child is unwell please keep them home until they are fully recovered and back to full health.

It is not a secret that New Zealand is short of teachers and finding relievers to cover sick teachers is challenging at best. Splitting classes is the last thing we choose to do, however the reality of the teacher shortage means that this is something we will have to do throughout this year if staff are unwell. Please help us to keep the school staffed by keeping your child home if they are unwell. A child does not need to have Covid to be considered sick.

We will be maintaining our hygiene and cleaning practices, masks are available should you wish for your child to wear one and hand sanitiser is available in all classrooms. We will not be notifying individual classrooms if Covid is present as we have in the past. This paragraph in the newsletter is confirmation that it is in the school and affecting people.

<u>Staff Professional Learning - Mitey:</u>
This Thursday all of the teachers will be observing our Mitey Facilitator (Belinda Brown) in action as she works in several classrooms over the morning modelling a Mitey Lesson. Mitey is a programme we are introducing this year focusing on Mental Health. It connects to all areas of the curriculum as well as our PB4L teaching and learning, and school values.

Heatups:

Hot food at lunchtime is great on an autumnal day however lately we have had a few lunches with no names on them. Please ensure all heat ups are in an appropriate oven proof dish or securely wrapped in foil and clearly named with your child's first name, last name and room number.

Heat ups are simply that, heated in a pie warmer. A pie warmer does not cook, so please no raw or frozen foods.

Enrolments:

We will be doing our first Out of Zone Ballot for 2024 in the first days of March. Our next ballot will be in October. If you have anyone you know In Zone or Out of Zone with children due to start school in the next 12 - 24 months, or if you have a child who will be starting school, please get them enrolled **now.**

This will mean we can accurately register for staffing allocations and manage student classroom placements.

Afterschool Care:

A reminder that any changes to bookings (additions or withdrawals) for After School Care need to be made no later than **1:30pm** on the day of the booking.

This allows us time to arrange additional staffing should it be required or reduce staffing if it is not required. Thank you for assisting us in keeping your children safe and After School Care appropriately staffed through early and clear communication.

<u>P.T.A</u>

We have a wonderful group of whānau members who support the kaiako, tamariki and wider staff at Salford School by providing extra bits and pieces such as the scooter track, contributing to the Year 6 leaver's books, providing a donation towards the Year 6 camp to help keep costs down and supporting with other initiatives such as the garden boxes for clubs and lego for lego club and lego therapy.


