They were lucky to listen to Maioro Barton who is a para-athlete and has represented New Zealand in athletics and wheelchair basketball. He spoke about the challenges of having a disability and not letting it slow him down.

Jess Crowe shared her story about being one of a few females in the Armed Offenders Squad and the barriers she overcame to be highly regarded in her field. Both emphasised the importance of resilience, commitment and perseverance when it comes to pursuing your passion. Students also listened to various head students from around the Waikato including our very own Cullen Fagan who spoke eloquently about his leadership journey so far.

In the afternoon Ōtorohanga College worked alongside Hamilton Boys High School and Taupo-nui-a-Tia College on strategies to implement leadership into our kura in their own ways, focusing on their strengths.

A goal the boys in the group came up with was a fundraiser to get more basketball equipment for the school grounds to accommodate our College's love of basketball.

Pūhoro is a programme with a mission to grow a leading Māori STEMM community guided by their unique Māori worldview. Ōtorohanga College is privileged to be a part of this kaupapa. Each term a Wānanga is held at The University of Waikato that builds upon the weekly in College sessions.
