Anniversary of King Charles' Coronation Salute


There was a firing of the cannons on Monday to commemorate the first anniversary of the King's coronation. Some of the classes attended. There is to be a firing next week an-

Winter illness

As we enter influenza (flu) season it's time to get prepared as flu can spread quickly in schools and colleges. Following very low flu levels due to COVID-19 and all the public health measures in place, natural immunity is lower, so it's really important to get a flu vaccination this year. Immunisation is recommended and FREE for tamariki aged 3-12 years and those 4 years or under who have had a stay in hospital for asthma or other breathing problems.

WINTER ILLNESS

Colds, flu and other respiratory illness are common in schools during winter. Here are some simple tips to prevent the spread of illness:



- Cough and sneeze into a tissue or your elbow, not your hand.
- Regularly clean high touch surfaces door handles, taps, table tops, phones, computer keyboards, etc.
- If unwell, stay at home until 48 hours after symptoms have gone.
- Get a flu jab NOW it's FREE for those aged 6
 months to 12 years, pregnant women, and lots of
 other people.

Mobile Phone Use - p46 of Management Policy

Description and purpose

The Government has introduced regulations that require all state schools and kura to have student phone rules in use. Rules must be in use as soon as possible in Term 1 2024 and no later than Term 2.

International research indicates some key challenges with cellphones at school such as being a major distraction for our students. These rules are designed to ensure that the learning of all students is maximised, while minimizing any potential for distraction and cyberbullying. Our approach is "away for the day", meaning the device should be turned off, and handed in to the teacher.

The regulations require that schools must ensure students do not use or access a phone while they are attending school, during lunch time and breaks. This includes students who are on a school course or visit outside the school grounds.

The rules are to be in effect no later than the start of Term 2, 29 April 2024.

Guidelines

At Roseneath School students in years 5-8 may bring a mobile phone to school. The mobile phones are collected at the start of the day and locked in a secure place in the classroom. They are handed out at the end of the day. It is important to note that if students do make the decision to bring a cell phone to school, they do so at their own risk. The school is not responsible for any loss or damage to any cell phone.

We understand that some parents like their children to have a phone to communicate with them after school, cell phones will be available for students during the after school pick up time. If a parent or caregiver needs to contact their child urgently during the day, they should call the school office.

Appropriate usage

There may be times when students will be able to access and use their cellphones. However, this is the exception and will always be monitored by teaching staff.

Students are allowed to use or access a phone when:

- a phone is needed for health reasons (for example, to monitor insulin levels); or
- a phone is needed to help a student with a disability or learning support need (for example, to assist with impaired communication); or
- a teacher requires students to use phones for a specific educational task or purpose (for example, for a class assignment); or
- the principal decides that they are needed for special circumstances.

EOTO

At Roseneath School students who are on a Leadership Licence trip outside of the school grounds are required to take a mobile phone for safety reasons. The phone is handed to the student at the start of the trip and collected from the student upon return to school. During camp, students in years 5-8 may take a mobile phone which is to be handed to a staff member before leaving for the camp. Phones are to be stored in a safe place (in the lead teacher's cabin). Students will be allowed to use their phone to contact parents for 15 minutes at 7pm on the evening of an overnight camp.

Please note with all exemptions and exceptions appropriate usage guidelines and other relevant school rules still apply.

Inappropriate usage

If we see a student using a personal digital device inappropriately or without permission during the school day, we confiscate it. After the student locks the device, we place it in the office to be collected at the end of the day by a parent or guardian.

Breaches of the cell phone rules include (but are not limited to):

- using the device when not permitted
- · any sort of bullying, including online bullying
- taking photos or videos of other people without their permission
- forwarding inappropriate messages or content

An Hour a Day of Reading, Writing and Mathematics p11 of Curriculum and Student Achievement Policy

From the beginning of Term 1 2024, Roseneath School staff will ensure that we comply with government requirements to teach an average of one hour a day each in reading / pānui, writing / tuhi tuhi, and maths / pāngaru. This could be in both dedicated lessons and in other learning areas as students read, write, and engage with maths in a variety of purposes and contexts across the school day.

This change sets a clear expectation that all year 0-8 students should receive regular, focussed instruction in these core areas. Like many schools and kura, at Roseneath School we are already teaching an hour of reading, writing, and maths each day.

Learning to read, write, and do maths is important in everything we do. Daily teaching has been shown to lift student progress, when coupled with a high-quality curriculum taught using evidence-informed teaching practices. Teachers are asked to be deliberate, intentional and purposeful in their teaching. Whether during dedicated lessons or integrated work, teaching should be appropriate to the student's current ability and next steps

Teachers will deliberately and purposefully dedicate time to teaching these core skills. Teaching techniques like inquiry learning, collaborative learning, and learn through play will continue to be used so students stay engaged with their learning.

Special events are enriching for students, and the intent of the "one hour a day" policy is not to detract from or limit these events. The policy allows us to manage the average amount of reading, writing, and maths teaching time through a week. This provides the flexibility required to accommodate days where students may spend time out of the classroom.

As part of a balanced curriculum, schools may also have a special event that may last for three or more days (such as school camp). While events like this are excluded from the "one hour a day" policy requirements, where there is the opportunity to do so, we will plan for and integrate reading, writing, or maths learning into the event.

The Board will provide assurance to the Education Review Office (ERO) that Roseneath School staff are meeting the new obligations. This will be validated by ERO during school visits. ERO will monitor and report on compliance with the reading, writing and maths teaching time requirements through the Board Assurance processes.
