Government Spin...

There have been a lot of snippets in the media about the government's saving of Maths with its Make It Count initiative. Most of the time I do not publicly express concerns over government directives but this time I must.

Firstly, there is no research to support the proposed "structured maths" approach they are lauding. In fact, according to Massey University Maths professors, structured maths does not exist. There are programmes overseas, such as the system in Singapore, which have some connection to the Science of Learning ideals and so are positioned as structured maths approaches. Our societal expectations and norms are vastly different to Singapore, so how effective will transferring this textbook based system be? A society where the norm is for hours of homework to be done outside of school. How many of you want this for your children?

So how are the government going to produce a non-existent structured maths programme within the next 5 months? Why are they purchasing massive amounts of commercially produced textbooks now, even though an identified structured maths programme is yet to be developed? How are they going to research, trial and test this approach before requiring all schools to adopt it in January 2025? (The structured literacy approaches (yes there is more than 1 way) that are happening now are firmly based on researched, tried and tested methods of instruction that have taken years to validate as effective.)

All this is urgently required because the adjusted assessment data showed 80% of Year 8s would not achieve the expected levels of the new curriculum. Data that is based on an assessment attempted by 853 students in 42 schools assessing students' Maths ability on a curriculum not yet being taught!

The current method of teaching maths has flaws and needs changing, but the rushed, unhindered, "speed is more important than research" approach the government is taking is more dangerous. Careful examination of what we are being told is required.
